A lex Flores, affectionately known to his SF friends as "the Godfather," was an active and contributing member of Chapter XV since its beginning.

Alex was a native San Antonian, born here to a family of 13 children. He began military service as an MP in the National Guard, which he joined along with two brothers. He completed the medic course at Fort Sam Houston, went to jump school at Fort Bragg and did a stint in Korea with the 82nd Airborne Division. He also was deployed to the Dominican Republic during its civil war in 1965.

After completing his Special Forces training, he was promoted to E7 in Vietnam and received two Purple Hearts. As part of the Pleiku Mike Force sent to Camp Ben Het, he saw some of the most intense combat of the Vietnam war. During his career, he served with the 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th Groups and with Cambodian troops in Vietnam. Alex died at the San Antonio Military Medical Center on March 18. He is survived by his daughters Claudia Flores and Lisa Estrada; son Alejandro Rey Flores; sisters Anita Rodriguez, Cida Saucedo, Lucinda Ricondo and Olga Galan; brothers Salvador Flores and Victor Flores; five grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Visitation was held on March 25 at Mission Park Funeral Chapels North. Interment will be at Fort. Sam Houston National Cemetery at a later date.

The family has asked that those who wish may make a donation in Alex's name to the Special Forces Association Scholarship Fund, or to a charity of their choice.

In World War II he fought with the armies of three different countries.

After that things *really* start to get complicated.

Soldier, resistance fighter, secret agent, inventor and American patriot.

This is his true life story.

Born in New York and raised in Italy, Vito "Tutuc" Cellini went from street gangster to soldier to resistance fighter to secret agent – all before he was twenty-one years of age.

Drafted into the fascist Italian army against his will and sent to the front line, he deserted and joined Tito's Yugoslavian Partisans fighting the Nazis, returning to Italy to join the Allies amid one of the biggest cover-ups of the European war.

He ended the war working covertly with the American OSS (forerunner of the CIA) hunting down criminals and undesirables.

Sailing home to New York in 1948 with a forged Italian passport and just 12 cents in his pocket, he was arrested at Ellis Island. Since then, Cellini's inventiveness, reputation and irrepressible sense of adventure have taken him all over the world, often putting his life in great peril.

Respected by the New York Mafia, Cellini later negotiated with some of the most feared organized crime syndicates in Italy. Nicaragua's President Somoza sought his advice on guerilla warfare and weapons tactics, and while in Nicaragua he was embroiled in the assassination of a high profile journalist and had to flee for his life.

> Cellini has kept Federal Agents informed of credible plots to assassinate known enemies of the United States. He even served for a short time, albeit inadvertently, as bodyguard for a notorious drug lord in Mexico.

He has never been afraid of taking the law into his own hands because, he says, sometimes that is the only way to survive.

His inventions, including the *Cellini Muzzle Brake*, have earned him 19 patents and the undying respect and gratitude of members of the U.S. Special Forces and Law Enforcement. He has been privileged to count some of America's most revered and decorated military heroes among his closest friends.

Cellini is, more than anything, a patriot; a man who puts honor above all. And while some of his adventures make fictional spies and secret agents pale by comparison, unlike his fictitious counterparts, Cellini always remained faithful to one woman.

Now at the age of 94, he finally feels comfortable talking about his life, and he isn't pulling any punches.

The good. The bad. The ugly. The truth.



We have all had the opportunity be part of when "kings go



Scholarship Applications Now Due

Pat Connolly, Scholarship Committee Chairman, announces that applications are being accepted from now until **30 April, 2019**. PLEASE NOTE THE DATES HAVE BEEN CHANGED FROM PAST YEARS. Here are the revised scholarship guidelines:

Special Forces Chapter XV Education Grant

The Special Forces Chapter XV Education Grant provides scholarship grants to SFA Chapter XV members, their dependents, children and grandchildren. The number and amount of grants are determined by the budget and the Chapter Scholarship Selection Committee, with approval of the Chapter president. Recipients will be announced at the May Membership Meeting.

Eligibility:

Applicant must be a Chapter member in good standing or the dependent spouse, child or grandchild of a member in good standing, or child or grandchild of a deceased member who was in good standing at the time of death. Applicant must have been accepted by, or already attending an accredited college, university or vocational institution.

Application Process:

Applications must be submitted and postmarked not later than 30 April to be condsidered. Eligible applicants must submit the following:

- a. A sponsor letter from Chapter XV member that states full name, member number and relationship to applicant, and the applicant's full contact information.
- b. A personal letter detailing the applicant's education plans, career aspirations, school they plan to attend and planned use of the grant.
- c. Copies of most recent academic transcripts, SAT scores and other scholastic achievements, and a recent photograph.
- d. Reference letter from teacher(s), school counselor or principal. (minimum of one required)
- e. Summary of extra-curricular activities, non-academic achievements and hobbies.
- f. A copy of the application to the school, or acceptance letter from the registrar that the student has already been enrolled.
- All items listed above are required. Incomplete applications will not be considered. Submit applications to:


