

Born in New York and raised in Italy, Vito "Tutuc" Cellini went from street gangster to soldier to resistance fighter to secret agent – all before he was twenty-one years of age.

Drafted into the fascist Italian army against his will and sent to the front line, he deserted and joined Tito's Yugoslavian Partisans fighting the Nazis, returning to Italy to join the Allies amid one of the biggest cover-ups of the European war.

He ended the war working covertly with the American OSS (forerunner of the CIA) hunting down criminals and undesirables.

Sailing home to New York in 1948 with a forged Italian passport and just 12 cents in his pocket, he was arrested at Ellis Island. Since then, Cellini's inventiveness, reputation and irrepressible sense of adventure have taken him all over the world, often putting his life in great peril.

Respected by the New York Mafia, Cellini later negotiated with some of the most feared organized crime syndicates in Italy. Nicaragua's President Somoza sought his advice on guerilla warfare and weapons tactics, and while in Nicaragua he was embroiled in the assassination of a high profile journalist and had

to flee for his life.

Cellini has kept Federal Agents informed of credible plots to assassinate known enemies of the United States. He even served for a short time, albeit inadvertently, as bodyguard for a notorious drug lord in Mexico.

He has never been afraid of taking the law into his own hands because, he says, sometimes that is the only way to survive.

His inventions, including the *Cellini Muzzle Brake*, have earned him 19 patents and the undying respect and gratitude of members of the U.S. Special Forces and Law Enforcement. He has been privileged to count some of America's most revered and decorated military heroes among his closest friends.

Cellini is, more than anything, a patriot; a man who puts honor above all. And while some of his adventures make fictional spies and secret agents pale by comparison, unlike his fictitious counterparts, Cellini always remained faithful to one woman.

Now at the age of 94, he finally feels comfortable talking about his life, and he isn't pulling any punches.

The good. The bad. The ugly. The truth.




Mike Brown donated an extra keg. Pat Connolly secured a cutout board of Budweiser astronauts, so everybody mugged for the cameras.

Our Special Forces guys were really 'special'

Our second annual Chapter Cruise was a blast. Everyone had a great time on the splendid beaches of Cozumel and Belize. Our group of 43 people took full advantage of the *Carnival Vista's* many amenities, including an on-board brewpub. (Chuck Rose, John Lopez, you are karaoke superstars!) Karen Hermann ran interference for us on all manner of issues, proving herself a treasure in the world of cruising.

But this report is really for the people who were NOT on the cruise. It is about the Military Appreciation Day hosted by the ship and attended by around 500 people. In that large auditorium on the high seas, Chapter XV did itself proud!

he ship's cruise director led us in singing the National Anthem and all the military service songs. Then he opened the floor to an "open forum" in which people from all walks of life expressed their appreciation for service members – sons, daughters, fathers or brothers, friends or patients who had served in Afghanistan, Iran, Vietnam. These were short but heartfelt stories of injury, death and near-death, love and sacrifice at home.

Then the microphone came around to the area where our Chapter members were seated. First, Chuck Rose gave an extemporaneous introduction of Chapter XV and our oldest member, Vito Cellini. In a few well-chosen words, he brought

the audience to its feet with a standing ovation for Vito, the only World War II veteran in the crowd.

ext, Buddy Gee introduced Chapter member Huong Le, who was a combat interpreter for the Special Forces in Vietnam and, after four years in a North Vietnamese prison camp, made his way to Dallas and a successful career. Another big ovation.

Finally, Merrill Hall took the mic and asked for Korean War veterans to stand (The only one, Air Force veteran Elliott Johnson, was a member of our cruise group), and then gave all Vietnam veterans in the audience a chance to stand and be appreciated.

It was a situation where anyone could see that Special Forces are truly "special." For sure, we all were proud to be part of that group in that auditorium on that day.

Will you answer the call again?

une has a few holidays and remembrances that are important to the American veteran. The US Army Birthday is June 14, which also happens to be Flag Day. The other is D-Day on June 6, which seems to get the majority of the public's attention when it comes to World War II. So much so that one could not blame the average person on the street if he or she believed that D-Day was the start of the war.

Of course the War – regarding direct US Combat action – began with the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. U.S. forces almost immediately entered into combat in the Pacific Theater. U.S. forces entered into direct combat against the Axis powers in North Africa almost one year later. Shortly thereafter, in July of 1943, the ground campaign in Italy began. The United States had been fighting incredible battles for over two and a half years before D-Day, but D-Day is what has captured the public's imagination.

We know, however, it is not the one who gets the most attention that necessarily gets the job done. Without taking anything away from the importance of those who took part in the Normandy Invasion, they would not have won the war by themselves. The reality of German and Italian forces already weakened by the campaigns in Africa and Italy played a part. The coordinated efforts of the many different Resistance factions and the OSS were a critical part of winning the war in general and that of D-Day in specific. These and other factors which contributed to the mission of defeating the Axis were all vital

parts of the effort and the victory – even when their contributions were not (or could not be) openly recognized.

here is a similar situation within the Kingdom of God. People often dismiss their own importance as a non-contributor. The focus is on priests, pastors and preachers. The missionaries and the particularly prayerful also get some attention. But the reality is the Kingdom needs all people to make many different contributions in the mission to redeem the world. Jesus declared His mission when He stated that God the Father had anointed Him "to set at liberty those who are oppressed" (Luke 4:18).

Those alive today are called to continue this mission of Christ, and you have an important part of this mission. "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ... For the body does not consist of one member but of many... If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, yet one body. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it" (1 Corinthians 12:12–27). You answered the call to Liberate the Oppressed before. Will you answer the call again?


